INFLUENCING EU DEVELOPMENT POLICY AND PROGRAMMES

EU-Africa Strategy

On 20th May, WCS EU published its recommendations regarding the European Commission communication titled 'Towards a comprehensive Strategy with Africa'. We believe that the strategy provides the foundation for an ambitious partnership between the EU and Africa and welcome the strong focus on facilitating a green transition. <u>Read more</u>

COMBATING DEFORESTATION

The FGMC Programme

The Forest Governance, Markets and Climate (FGMC) Programme funded by the UK Government aims to address forest and wildlife crime and illegal deforestation in the Mekong, Central Africa, and Indonesia, and also aims to improve international and national governance frameworks and business standards for intact forests, climate and biodiversity. WCS EU staff, Janice Weatherley-Singh, Director, and Arnaud Goessens, Senior Manager, are engaged in the implementation of activities.

European Climate Law

On 6th February, WCS EU submitted comments on the roadmap regarding the European Climate Law, which aims to help achieving climate neutrality by 2050, highlighting the important role of intact forests. <u>Read more</u>

On 17th June, WCS EU submitted a response to the public consultation on the EU Climate Pact. We believe that the EU Climate Pact should incorporate action to ensure the conservation of the world's last remaining intact forests. COUNTER-WILDLIFE TRAFFICKING

EU Environmental Crime Directive

Supporting Field Implementation through Funding and Partnerships

Sustainable Wildlife Management (SWM) Programme

The Sustainable Wildlife Management (SWM) Programme is a major international initiative that aims to improve the conservation and sustainable use of wildlife in forest, savannah and wetland ecosystems. It is being funded by the European Union with co-funding from the French Facility for Global Environment (FFEM) and the French Development Agency (AFD). The initiative is coordinated by a dynamic consortium of four partners, namely the FAO, CIFOR-ICRAF, CIRAD, and WCS. The SWM Programme is developing innovative, collaborative, and scalable new approaches to conserve wild animals and protect ecosystems, whilst at the same time improving the livelihoods of Indigenous Peoples and local communities who depend on these resources. Projects are being piloted and tested with governments and communities in 16 participating countries. <u>Read more</u>

WCS EU staff, Caroline Abid, Chief of Party SWM Programme and Arnaud Goessens, Senior Manager (SWM R1 Focal Point), are engaged in the direct implementation of the SWM Programme by WCS (with which we are affiliated), through WCS's country programme offices in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), the Republic of Congo (RoC), Madagascar, and Papua New Guinea (PNG).

The challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic required significant adaptation in the field implementation of the SWM Programme. However, it also led to the publication of a white paper aimed at informing decision-makers about the drivers of zoonotic disease outbreaks and proposing strategies for their prevention.

- DRC: The Free, Prior, and Informed Consent (FPIC) protocol was signed with the Eboyo and Bapukeli communities, and contextual studies continued, with a particular focus on hunting and wildlife monitoring.
- **Congo**: Contextual studies were conducted on protein product value chains, bushmeat consumption, hunting practices, and the ecological context to provide valuable insights for guiding the future activities of the Congo programme.
- **Madagascar**: Support for fish farming activities continued and was expanded to include poultry farming, accompanied by material distributions and training sessions. Additionally, veterinary kiosks were introduced in communities, and two community vaccinators per community were trained to help prevent disease outbreaks.
- PNG: Efforts focused on community consultations to design future Conservation Deeds, a PNG-specific legal tool that enables communities to establish conservation areas and manage land under customary law.
